Founded in 1869, The Agnes Irwin School is an independent college preparatory day school for girls, located 12 miles west of Philadelphia.

Enrollment

The total enrollment of grades PreK-12 is 605 (26% are students of color; 30% receive financial aid). There are 285 students in grades 9-12 and 73 in the Class of 2018. Students come from 85 zip codes in Philadelphia and the surrounding suburbs. There are several students from China. 62% matriculated in Lower School.

Special Programs Required for All Students

Media Literacy [9]: This course encourages students to look past the face value of the media (Internet, television, magazines, newspapers) and question the motives beneath the messages. Topics include internet safety, research skills, copyright and fair use, information seeking strategies, and advertising techniques & consumer culture. (Pass/Fail)

Required Science Sequence: AIS's preferred sequence for science courses is: Physics (9); Chemistry (10); Biology (11). Advanced Electives (11 or 12): Biology II (some Honors); Chemistry II (all Honors); Physics II (all Honors); Environmental Sustainability/Modern Conservation [*with Honors* option]. See course details below.

Senior Assemblies [12]: Each senior prepares and present a 10-minute research-based speech with visuals to the Upper School student body and faculty (approx. 300 people). Topics range from the performing arts to scientific research to current events. The presentation is graded by a team of faculty. The topic and grade are listed on the final transcript.

Senior Seminars & College 101 Series [12]: Following exams, seniors participate in two weeks of mini-courses taught by faculty and designed to parallel collegiate offerings in both context and time frame. Students also participate in a series of College 101 workshops on topics designed for college preparation (e.g., personal finance, self-health, self-defense and "AIS Graduates' Look at College Life").

SSP-9 [9]: As a precursor to the Special Studies Program, SSP-9 is a twoweek project-based program focusing on interdisciplinary problem-solving. Students are presented with new challenges each day that draw on curricular work mastered during the year. Examples include: video game design, wearable technology and cryptology.

Special Studies Program [10-11]: This two-week program of travel, internships, service work, and cultural immersion/exploration. 2017 offerings included: Art on the Farm; Careers in Medicine; Civil Rights; Cultural Immersion in Cuba; Design Thinking; Edinburgh Fringe Festival; Engineering; Farming & Entrepreneurship; Follow Ben Franklin; Forensics; Habitat for Humanity; Holistic Health & Mindfulness; Immigration; Navajo Nation; Philadelphia Past & Present; school exchange in Ecuador/Australia.

Wellness [9-12]: AIS's Wellness curriculum focuses on developing skills to promote healthy lifestyle choices, self-knowledge and self-esteem. Topics include relationships; emotional, physical and community wellness; Red Cross First Aid; financial literacy; self-defense, and the college search/application processes.

Electives Explanations (alpha, non-dept. order)

Agency [12]: Students will function as a Marketing Agency, promoting an idea or event by creating a campaign to include print, media, graphics, branding, commercial, etc. (1/2 credit/semester course)

Artist as Entrepreneur [12]: Exploring the business of the arts, students learn to develop diverse product inventory, consider fair market value/ pricing, generate electronic presence—the tools needed to promote the arts as a business. (1/2 credit/semester course)

Bioethics: This non-lab, research-based science elective is concerned with dilemmas caused when the facts of medical/genetic research conflict with the norms and needs of society and ethical decision-making at the level of the individual, the community, and the nation. (1/2 or full credit)

Computer Science I, II, III Honors (Ind. St.) [10-12]: Project-based classes developing foundation principles of mechanics and programming using Python programming language. Major areas of study include data and control structures, algorithm development and user-interface design. Students in CS I design a video game with Media Arts students.

Emerging Infectious Diseases: This course covers aspects of the emergence and spread of infectious diseases (including Ebola, Zika and Malaria) that are global challenges to human progress and survival. (1/2 or full credit) [*with Honors option*]

Engineering for the Future [10-12]: Designed to introduce students to the field of engineering through in-class discussion and hands-on lab experiments beginning by defining a problem and collaboratively developing possible solutions, using MakerSpace lab. (½ credit/semester course)

Environmental Sustainability: In this elective, students discover ways to reengineer necessities for survival in our modern and future cultures, by working on creating sustainable food production models. Students will also with younger students in order to help them understand the importance of sustainable technologies. (½ credit/semester course) [*with Honors* option].

Global Health & the Girl Child [12]: This seminar-style course features a survey of topics on international women's health and human rights. ($\frac{1}{2}$ credit/semester course)

Independent Science Research [9-12]: Students conduct science research outside of school, and are matched with mentors from local university and industrial communities, supervised by AIS's Science chair. The research results in a culminating project to be presented and published in AIS's annual science journal. The course is graded pass/fail and earns $\frac{1}{2}$ or 1 credit for successful completion, depending on the project's scope.

Innovations [11-12]: Project-based course using CAD and other drawing programs to design and fabricate objects using 3-D printers and Laser Cutter in MakerSpace lab. Students develop skills in elements of design, working knowledge of CAD, applied mathematics and spatial reasoning. (1/2 or full credit)

Media Arts I and II - [9-12]: Using the Adobe Creative Suite and other digital tools, students develop technical skills and gain knowledge of design and digital applications through the hands-on use of computers, scanners and digital cameras. The culminating course allows for a student-driven concentration. Students apply advanced design concepts to material, with access to 3-D printers and a laser cutter, resulting in a digital portfolio.

Modern Conservation [11-12]: Students interact with a community organization outside of AIS to help raise awareness of local environmental issues; topics include biodiversity, landscape management, and environ-mental ethics. (½ credit/semester course) [*with Honors* option]

Production Direction [11-12]-This course focuses on the role of the director in both live and digital production. (1/2 credit/semester course)

Women In Antiquity: Semester seminar-style class in Classics/History that examines the place and role of women and girls in ancient Greek and Roman society, using literary, archeological and artistic evidence.

Other Special Opportunities

Big Timber Arts Round-Up [11-12]: In October, a select group of Agnes Irwin students join students from the Haverford School, and a local high school at a ranch in Montana for a five-day symposium (writing, art, drama or photography), working with Western writers and artists.

Human Relationships Seminar [11-12]:Human Relationships is a biannual, non-credit ten-week course for Agnes Irwin, Baldwin School and Haverford School students. The class examines the complexities of human relationships through discussion of various topics that impact interpersonal relationships. Topics include societal norms, sex, gender, sexuality, feminism and more. Discussion is largely student-led, with readings and prompts provided by the team of four faculty who facilitate the program.

Robotics Team: One of a few all-girl teams in the region, the AIS robotics team grows out of an active Lego® Robotics middle school program. The robotics team annually designs a robot to enter the F.I.R.S.T. robotics competition, which involves thousands of schools from around the world. Typically participating in two or three competition events in the Mid-Atlantic Robotics District, the team has garnered many awards in its 15-year history and continues to introduce girls to real-world, hands-on science and technology.
